HAST THOU CONSIDERED MY SERVANT JOB?

Those are words that Jehovah spoke to Satan (Job 1:8). God went on to tell him that Job was unique, complete, upright, feared God, and was one who shunned evil. That is quite a commendation from the One who know every single think there is to know about a person.

Most Bible students are quite familiar with the tragic circumstances that beset Job and his family. Job’s steadfastness and patience have been renowned worldwide throughout the ages. But here are three important things about Job as a father, and these things are seen before his children and livestock were taken from him.

As a father, Job showed his children that his first devotion was to God Almighty, not material things. Possessing thousands of head of livestock helped make Job “the greatest of all the men of the east” (Job 1:3). Job did not allow his stuff to crowd out, hinder, or diminish his devotion to the God of heaven.

Dads, what do your children see as your number one commitment: stuff, or God? Believe me, they can tell what is number one without your saying a word!

As a father, Job recognized that his children made mistakes. Job offered burnt offerings on behalf of his grown children, saying, “It may be that my sons have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts” (Job 1:5). There are some fathers who never seem to have anything good to say about their children, and they seldom, if ever, give them any support and positive exhortation. On the other hand, some dads are blind. They are convinced that their “little Mary” and “Billy, Jr.” could never do anything wrong, ever. They would never be deceptive, never be self-ish, and never be disrespectful. There are many great children in the world, but one is perfect. Dads need to accept the truth that all sin (Romans 3:23). Job admitted that about his own children.

As a father, Job showed his concern for the spiritual welfare of his children. It was on their behalf that he rose up early and offered burnt offerings to God. Don’t you know that it makes a child, regardless of whether he is five or fifty, swell up with delight to hear and see that his daddy is doing something for his spiritual benefit! Dads, there is more to being a dad than putting food on the table and showing a child how to hit, throw, or kick a ball. The number one task of fathers is to bring up their children in the Lord’s nurture and admonition (Ephesians 6:4).

We will always remember Job’s endurance. But let’s not forget what the Bible also shows us about him as a father before disaster struck his life.

CAN ONE RELY ON THE BIBLE?

YES, ABSOLUTELY. While we do not have an original copy
of the Bible, it has been faithfully handed down from one genera-
tion to another.

Just as the writings of Shakespeare can be reproduced by com-
paring the many and varied copies of that author's work, so we
can verify the Bible by comparing its manuscripts and transla-
tions. In fact, there are far more serious discrepancies among
other works than among Bible manuscripts.

Compare the span of time and the number of manuscripts of the
sacred text with other ancient writings:

- The ancient classical history of *Caesar's Gallic War* was com-
posed about 58-50 B.C. with the oldest known manuscript dat-
ing to about A.D. 850. Thus a gap of 900 years exists between
composition and copies. Only ten manuscripts of the history
are known. Yet all scholars accept these as reliable history.
- The *Roman History of Livy* was written between 59 B.C. to
A.D. 17, but its oldest know manuscripts were made about
A.D. 300. Only 35 copies are known to exist. Yet it is ac-
cepted without question.
- The *History of Thucydides*, written 460-400 B.C., is repro-
duced from only eight manuscripts which were produced 1300
hundred years later (A.D. 900). Again, it is not disputed.
- The *History of Herodotus* (450-425 B.C.) is translated from
only eight copies which were made from the original 1300
years later—about A.D. 900. It is accepted without question.

How do these compare with the New Testament? Revelation (its
final book) was written by A.D. 96.

A span of only 250 years brings us to A.D. 350, the date of
widely accepted Bible codices. In addition, we have 4000 papyrus
fragments written from about A.D. 130 to A.D. 250. This puts us
within 30 to 150 years of the book of Revelation. Further, practi-
cally from the time John penned the original autograph, early
"church fathers" began quoting the New Testament (A.D. 90 to
A.D. 160), and we have their writings.

There are literally thousands more copies of Sacred Scriptures
which enable comparison, and give us assurance of a more accu-
rate text for the New Testament, than there is of any text of
Shakespeare. Jesus said, "My words shall not pass
away" (Matthew 24:35).
